The Harley-Davidson-Museum

The Harley-Davidson-Museum was established on July 12th, 2008, and is located in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, along the Menominee River Bank. This museum is the only Harley-Davidson Museum in the world.

It contains more than 450 Harley-Davidson motorcycles and hundreds of thousands of artefacts from the Harley-Davidson Motor Company's 118-year history.

This museum was built in a historically industrial area of Milwaukee. Prior to Harley-Davidson's purchase of the land from the city, the site was formerly used by the Milwaukee Department of Public Works, Lakeshore Sand Company and Morton Salt.

On June 1st, 2006, Harley-Davidson began the construction of the \$75 million complex. The site includes parking spaces for 1,000 motorcycles as well as 500 cars. The museum's façade also features a 5.2-meter-tall, steel Harley-Davidson sign.

The exhibitions spread throughout two floors. The motorbikes are displayed in chronological order, showing their evolution over the years. Additionally, Harley-Davidson's biggest collection of unrestored Harley's can be viewed there, too. Furthermore, there is a restaurant, café, retail shop, and special events spaces. In addition to this, you can find historic Harley-Davidson items that tell the company's history such as photographs, posters, advertisements, clothes, trophies, video footage of vintage and contemporary motorcycling, and interactive exhibits, like ten motorcycles that visitors can sit on.
